Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra started its journey with a group of young enthusiastic women from Howrah, who organized poor and marginalized women of the district to protect their interest towards sustainable livelihood during the devastating flood in year 1978. In 1985 NOSKK obtained the Foreign Contribution Registration from the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of West Bengal. This long endeavour towards fulfilling the mission of NOSKK has been possible only with cooperation and contribution of many National and International Resource Sharing Agencies, the State and National Level Government as well as Non-Government institutions along with innumerable individual resource person.

Our Vision:

The vision of Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra is a self-reliant society based on human values like cooperation, participation, justice, respect and love. In this society people will participate in a decentralized political process, where the economy will be based on localized production and consumption. NOSKK also facilitates Self Help Groups to support Women Empowerment through projects like Empowerment Workshops and a Self Defense Class (Karate) to achieve the Sustainable Development Goal of Gender Equality. This year our organization has welcomed many interns from different institutions. I would like to thank the MSW interns from Netaji Subhas Open University, Vidyasagar University, and Tata Institute of Social Science - TISS. Collaboration with Freunde der Erziehungskunst Rudolf Steiners from last four year they send volunteers from Germany.



Education:

Bhabiswat Sponsorship Programme: 20

From June 2018 our German Volunteers established with the help of NOSKK an Educational Sponsorship Programme to support intelligent but destitute students to continue and finish successfully their education. We connect one adolescent with one sponsor, who will support the family and the student so that they will be able to pay for all the school fees, school books and the important tuition classes.

So far, we have connected **20 ambitious students** from class 8 to College with sponsors from Germany. For the sponsored student and their parents, we regularly organize workshops about different topics. Last year the sponsored children participated in a Future-Planning Workshop and an Awareness Meeting about Child Right Protection (Early Marriage, Child Labour, Human Trafficking, sexual and physical Exploitation) to create more awareness and prevent cases.

Many of our sponsoring students lost their father or don't get any support from their families. But in the last year we already have seen some successful stories. In one case we convinced the parents of a girl not to arrange a marriage of their daughter until she has finished her education as a nurse, and thanks to the financial support and the counselling, the parents agreed to wait with the marriage and allow her to finish her college. In another case we supported one boy, who did not go school because he could not afford school admission fees, tuition classes and books and due to that did not have any motivation for going to school. Now, he is able to go to school, afford all the school expenses and he got new motivation and hope for his future.



Talim ki Taquat Power of Education: 59

NOSKK has taken initiative special class for children especially first learner those who are going to the government schools for formal education. NOSKK has tried to create an environment to those students which enhance them about formal education. Activities also include providing non formal school education, learning support and remedial teaching to children who are lagging behind due to various reasons like lower motivation level, poverty, dysfunctional family setup. Focus was given mainly on children between age group of 8 yr to 14yrs. Total **59 students** are enrolled mostly are girls students.

Maker Space workshop for the Science Students: 56

Programme was initiated from July 2019. Activity and schedule and planning was done closely consult with different dignitaries of American Centre - Monica Shie-Director, Nicola- Programme Specialist, Mr. Debasis Ghosh & Aishwarya Mondal and Mr. Amit Chowdhury - Srijan Creation.

Workshop was held on 18th February to 24th February 2020 at American Center. The workshop was 5 days. Total 56 students are taken part in this

Noskk Supported students of underprivileged section through books distribution which supports students in their education. This year 15 Students are getting benefit.

Skill Development:

Paschim Banga Society for Skill Development (PBSSD): **240 Trainee**

Paschim Banga Society for Skill Development (PBSSD) is an initiative of Department of Technical Education, Training and Skill Development Government of West Bengal. It was Launched on 16th February, 2016 by the Hon'ble CM. In 2017, the scheme has been aligned to the Common Norms of MSDE. The scheme converges all the skill development activities in the state by fulfilling the requirements of skilling the beneficiaries of other departments/ bodies and pooling the skilling funds under one umbrella. Aim of skilling individuals to empower them to engage in wage employment or self-employment and provides opportunities to move from informal to formal sectors.

Beautician Class (250 hours course) 60 participants in 2 running batch are learning Facial Treatment, Threading, Waxing, Manicure, Pedicure, Bridal Make- Up, Hair cutting and Hairstyle.

Tailoring Class (340 hours) 60 participants in 2 running batches are learning cutting, Measurement taking, Stitching, Different type of dress making with different cloth types.



Domestic Data Entry (400 hours) 60 participants in 2 running batches are learning Fundamentals of Computer, DOS, Windows 10, Microsoft Office 2016, Spoken English and Grooming.

Desktop Publishing: convergence with **Swapno Bhor and Utkarsha Bangla** 60 Kanyashree Girls are participants in 2 batches learning Fundamentals of Computer, Photoshop, Microsoft Office 2016, etc.

Machine Embroidery with Auto CAD: With collaboration with Vocational counsel NOSKK was empanel as a vocational training center total 20 Students are enrolled under this trade.

Strengthen Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Programme for Changing Gender Narratives and Norms and for promoting skills and jobs in Non Traditional occupations for girls and young women: 105

Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra is implementing the programme named 'Changing Gender Norms by Promoting Non-Traditional Skills and Livelihoods for Girls and Young Women' with support from the *Girls Count* Carmdaksh and *Ford Foundation*, in Howrah district.

Objectives of the programme:

The objective of the intervention is to influence larger narrative and norms around gender roles and occupations, and change the public discourse around it. The key objective is to promote non-traditional skills training for girls and young women in the district and employ them in areas of work that are considered to be non-traditional for creating space of the vulnerable as self- sustained and self – dependent.

Aims of the programme:

- ♣ Understand government policies and programmes around skill development and livelihoods.

Safe Village Programme: 4990 Students and 4353 Community Total 9343

Operation Red Alert began in early 2014 with the vision to end sex trafficking in India by preventing girls from ever entering it. it's aims to end sex trafficking in India by 2025. To achieve this target Noskk create awareness in 15 Schools in 2019-2020 about child-Trafficking, abuse, child-marriage, drop outs. We tried to aware the students about all those issues by showing some short video clips, comic books and gave them the child help line number so they can call on it, if they faced this kind of problems.



Legal Aid Service and Family Counselling: 138

In our NOSKKs Main Office we are running a Rehnuma Law Centre (RLC) and providing legal aid and family counselling through lawyers, Paralegal in our organization.

- ♦ From April 2019 till March 2020 we registered in total 138 cases in Howrah RLC (regarding Women Protection of from **Domestic** Violence. Family matter, Land Rights, Criminal Case, Bigamy, Missing Case, Issues).
- ♦ 23 cases are disposed, 5 cases got Legal Advice 110 cases are still ongoing.

SURIVIVING THE STREETS IN INDIA: THE INVISIBLES: 13600

Noskk aims to reach 8000 children in the age group of 1 - 18 years living in street situations by ensuring access to an identity document, of which 5600 will be linked with relevant social protection schemes and services. In the process, we will also ensure all stakeholders responsible for the care and protection of children in street situations fully understand their responsibilities and are sensitized about child friendly practices. Main Vision is ensuring well-being of children living in street situations. Overall Goal of the programme is to create an enabling environment for all children living in street situations in India, thereby strengthening their access to right to survival, development, participation and protection, eventually unlocking their limitless potential.

Project Area

Howrah City of West Bengal

Activities in Details:

Baseline/ Mapping of Children in Street Situations for intervention

8000 children living in street situations in Howrah City in West Bengal experience increased enrolment in schools; access to healthcare services, up skilling and employment opportunities, and financial services. With the access to a legal proof of identity (the Aadhaar card), the targeted children will most importantly be able to stake claim on their most basic rights.

NOSKK conducted baseline survey in Howrah Municipal Corporation to identify children in street situations in various hotspots. This project was initiated during JUNE 2019 to address issues of acknowledging the importance of an identify document for children in street situation, this project will provide children with an Aadhaar card, a legal identity document which is a crucial component of the slandered operating procedure. The children in street situations with our direct intervention with Legal registration and social security schemes. In Howrah we will target

8000 Children in 1-66 wards. Being initiated by Save the Children had partnered with Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra (NOSKK).

Survey Orientation meeting was held at Shanpur Office with all internal outreach our staff, Enumerators and Nabina Banerjee Programme Coordinator, Save the Children along with our secretary Rahima Khatun, we covered 15 wards of Howrah Municipal corporation. Total participants was 27. As per the priorities plan we started a survey after this meeting for benefitting the project. We have engaged 20 enumerators for this project we hope that with their co-operation working throughout the month along with them we will get an appropriate data on basis of which we can move forward to our project faster.

Legal Identity

Aadhaar Enrolment: Focusing on bringing about a awareness and ain-depth understanding of identity has been a priority to the street connected and slum dwellers children but along with that including them with all the government related schemes, where they have been left out, excluded from the society trying to including them making them knowledgeable, acquire and achieving the best of the services provided to them which enable them to being independent. Special child has also been inclusive helping them to acquire benefits such as Manobik schemes an aid to the children from the government. GPO Howrah has initiated that they opened a new counter for only street connected children through our strong advocacy. And they cooperate us to enrolled every day 30 -35 children covered in this GPO. As well as we continued to Adhaar enrolment to another bank like Axis Bank, Syndicate bank and Salkia Post office.

PAN Registration Camp:

Linking with social securities schemes will not have been possible without the help of the community support and cooperation. The club members, parents and community have always been eager and come forwarded to help us in many different ways such as publicity for the PAN camp. During Pan camp a so many people are gathered in the community. Some parents are encouraged and excited about their children getting PAN Cards. We are organising PAN Card registration through Campaigning we even get to know more about people while communicating with them sharing our social security schemes within this camp and Education, health & Hygiene, awareness side by side. Apart from children we also emphasise on the need to ensure that the fellow clean & regular habits to maintain good hygiene, the effect of right food and nutrition intake to generate positive energy.

Social Security Schemes:

Health Services/Routine Immunization Camps and Polio Drive:

Routine Immunization has also been our priorities along with all our other schemes and identities. The Superintendent of Howrah District Hospital and the ANM Staffs. Children from different communities are being encouraged for regular basic immunization. We even mobilising the drop-out children for immunization sharing awareness and providing information about benefits of proper immunization. Swastha Sathi-the other scheme has also been beneficiary to

the people, children around, collaborating with the Health Officer. NOSKK also have worked on pulse polio during the project period.

Health Camp in the Community:

Unhygienic living environment, deteriorating work conditions and long working hours adversely impact the overall well- being of the children. Therefore the captured the magnitude of the health problems faced by the children in street situation of illness, so we planed coming month NOSKK will conducted a camp on health issues through collaboration with health dept. in this month we covered Children in street situations went to different facilities of treatment, depending on accessibility, hospital facility Routine Immunization has also been our priorities along with all our other schemes and identities. all medical staffs are coordinate with us accordingly. Children from different communities are being encouraged for regular basic immunization. We even mobilising the drop-out children for immunization sharing awareness and providing information about benefits of proper immunization. We are mobilizing with mothers on different issues also.

Bank Account Opening:

Providing social security schemes to the children has been a part of our project. Social Security Scheme (Bank A/C opening) has been organised by us through the camp mode. The main motive for opening Bank A/C is: Savings Notion Availing Government Schemes. People are encouraged to open the A/C. IPPB i.e India Post Payment Bank, United Bank of India has been helping us throughout the campaigning.

School Enrolment:

Many drop out children at our hotspot area. In the project period we have enrolled them in various classes. They had dropped out for a many kind of family reasons. Mainly causes of poverty. When they were enrolled of school their family also very happy. For enrolment, we advocated in front of the teachers of different schools. And the teachers also cooperated with us. Now They are all continuing their study.

Child Group Formation:

In Project Period we formation 10 child groups in different hotspot area These groups have minimum 10 children in each group. They are very interested and enthusiastic. Now they planned, they will be sitting once in a month and discussion will be importance of Identity card and how to link social security schemes and their need-based issues. Especially for teenage girls who wants to open a Drop - in centre. Where they can talk about their sexual & reproductive health issues in their own way. .

Inaugurated a Drop In Centre (DIC)

On 10th January we inaugurated a DIC for our community-based children on the basis of a conducted survey. We used pre-tested questionnaires to assess them. The objective of DIC is for providing counselling & psychological support, physical health & reduce their abuse. It also meant to reduce stigma & discrimination, develop self-help groups to provide support them & their families. On the very day we provide free "Sanitary Napkins" to them ensured them about

their proper health & hygiene during their menstrual cycle. The DIC at Shanpur has provided a friendly environment to the girls who visits us. Our staff's provides them with healthy tips in consultation with our project associated doctor. They feel DIC is non-judgemental and provide freedom & protection. Participants get opportunities for better life.

#LIGHT UP HER LIFE:

National girl child day was celebrated on 24th January at Sir Syed Ahmed school Howrah with the students, street connected children & elite stake holders who joined us in celebrating such a beautiful day which turned memorable to us. We celebrated national girl child day by organising various cultural programmes, including awareness campaigns on issues facing by girl child in India such as education, nutrition, child marriage, medical care and protection. The objective behind this celebration is to provide support & opportunities to the girl child making them aware about their rights. Organising the programme has a positive impact towards the society & itself towards the girl child & increases the consciousness of the people & offer new opportunities to the girl child in the society.

Vicky Roy Photo Shoot:

We have started our journey through photography by Vicky Roy, of the street connected children. Amused kids had never seen such cameras, photo shoots before. They had an idea about such things to be used in fashion & glamour industries. Their photo shoot by Vicky Roy made them feel like celebrities. Multiple photos were taken to find the best one for the required brief. To customize their life stories through such photographs. The photography session has enabled them to pursue their dream & fulfil them through motivating themselves idolized Vicky Roy as one of them who shined as sunshine & turned successful.

Self -Defence workshop for the women and girls.: 75

Our programme has implemented from July 2019 we had closely consulted with American Centre about the outreach plan with Monica Shie- Director, Ms. Nicola Programme Specialist, Mr. Debasis Ghosh & Aishwarya Mondal, Avijit Mitra – Aikido India. In consultation with American centre we mobilise the colleges i.e. Bijay Krishna Girls College, Uluberia College, Prabhu Jagat Bandhu college, Surendranath College for Women, Nara Singha Dutta College, Dr. Kanailal Bhattacharya College and Panchla Mahavidyalaya etc. Workshop was start from 19th to 25th November 2019 from 1.00 p.m. to 4 p.m. at Lincon Room and Grand Finale was held at 4th March 2020.

Under the guidance of Ms. Nicola Programme Specialist, Mr. Debasis Ghosh & Aishwarya Mondal organised for women and girls under the aid of American Centre Kolkata in Collaboration with Aikido, India from 19th November 2019.

The programme was inaugurated on 19th November 2019 by Ms. Nicola – Programme Specialist. Mr. Debasis Ghosh & Ms. Aishwarya Mondal, Mr. Avijit Mitra – Aikido India; Ms. Rahima Khatun – Secretary Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra.

They also learned different techniques of AIKIDO. Very first day they started with specific Aikido warm up exercises. After that first techniques they learned Nikyo and Shiho nage techniques against Ai hanmi katate dori (attacking with the wrist grab in same profile). After learning this they practiced with their partner. Second techniques they learned Yoko Irimi and Sankyo techniques against Gyaku hanmi katate dori (wrist grab in opposite profile). Then follow with other techniques Tsuki (punching technique). Yoke irimi against Tsuki. Nikyo technique against Mune dori (collar grab from the front). Irimi nage against Shomen uchi (strike to the head with hand). Irimi nage against Jodan tsuki (face punch). Atemi (striking technique) against chocking from the front. Combination of the above-mentioned techniques were also taught. Each session was 3.30 hours after that they got 30 minutes for revision and correction of the techniques they have learned.



Mr. Krish Das, Deputy Director, American Center graced the programme during the concluding session. Ms. Nicola Programme Specialist, Mr. Debasis Ghosh & Ms. Aishwarya Mondal, Mr. Avijit Mitra, Ms. Rahima Khatun and Professor Ms. Karabi Mitra of Bijay Krishna Girls college are also grace this session. Our trainee students performed different techniques which they learned in last 5 days and they also got a task that they have to train at least one participant for 2 months on grand finale they will demonstrate with their partner and they will get certificate.

At the end of the day vote of thanks given by Ms. Rahima Khatun – Secretary, Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra.

Practice Session: After coming back from workshop they have found partner for their practice session. They trained their friends, sister, neighbour etc. The Colleges have appreciated this initiative very much. Students have taken classes in their college premises. They trained not only one participant but also they prepare two or three people for their performance.

Grand Finale: On 4th March 2020 in the presence of Mr. Krish Das, Deputy Director American Center and also Ms. Aishwarya Mondal & Mr. Debasis Ghosh from American center, Ms. Rahima Khatun - Secretary Noskk & Professor Karabi Mitra-Bijay Krishna Girls College programme was initiated at Lincon Room of American Center. Total 52 Participants are present on that day. Each participant performed with their new partner. After completion of this demonstration student share their experience about teaching their new partner and also learning from this workshop. According to Barnali Das, Women studies Department from Bijay Krishna Girls College "This workshop is a journey of self-confidence". She also shares that she overwhelmed to see that in last two months "We reach almost double women and girls with these skills". In future she wants to learn more skills of Aikido. Afsona Arbida Computer student from NOSKK vocational center says, "When I walk alone in the road, I get more confidence after learning self-defence". Junisha Mallick CAB Trainee- Noskk Vocational Center "I choose my profession as a CAB Driver; this training was helped a lot to get self confidence and fight against fear.

Prof. Karabi Mitra, from Bijay Krishan Girls College says "This workshop is a one step ahead to women empowerment." She is very thankful to American center and Noskk for choosing their students for the workshop.

After that they got certificate from Mr. Krish Das Deputy Director, American Center.

At the end of the day Ms. Rahima Khatun from Noskk and Debasis Ghosh from American center given vote of thanks.

Women Empowerment:

Self Help Groups: 261 SHGs with total 4500

Women are the most vulnerable members in unprivileged community especially among minorities. Due to lack of education, low social status, unemployment they often face humiliation, domination from family members and society as well. NOSKK thought about collectivisation women

through SHG formation & microfinance initiatives in order to strengthen & empower them. The basic theory is that, microfinance empowers women by putting capital in their hands and allowing them to earn independently and contribute financially to their households and communities. This economic empowerment is expected to generate increased self-esteem, respect, and other forms of empowerment for women beneficiaries. Involvement in successful income-generating activities should translate into greater control and empowerment.

- ♦ Till March 2019 our Microfinance Programme is running in 3 Blocks of Howrah District, Uluberia-2, Panchla and Sankrail in total 45 villages.
- ♦ 18 of our NOSKK staff are monitoring 261 SHGs with total 4500 Members.

Nai Roshni Leadership Training: 125

From March 2019, NOSKK implemented the training of Nai Roshni – *The Scheme for Leadership Development of Minority Women*", supported by the Ministry of Minority Affairs in India.

The Objective

The empowerment of women is not only essential for equity, but also constitutes a critical element in our fight for poverty reduction, economic growth and strengthening of civil society. The objective of the programme is to empower, to strengthen and to in still confidence among Indian women by gaining knowledge, tools and techniques for interacting with the Government System, Bank System and other institutions and social topics like Health, Education and Rights. So those trained women can become leadership roles and assert and protect their women rights collectively or individual in their surrounded communities.

Though the programme, they can become independent and confident members of the community and spread their knowledge and skills as a leader and role-model for other women.

The Target Group:

The Target Group includes women belonging to all minorities including Muslim, Sikh, Christian, Buddhist, Zoroastrian and Jain. To create a group of plurality and diversity and increase solidarity and unity, 25% of non-minority groups are also permitted and welcomed.

Nurturing and Handholding under Non- Residential Training:

After complete the training as per guideline we are continuous Nurturing and hand holding to women who have undergone leadership development training. Regular meetings was held for these groups.

Livelihood

Bunan Hastakala Producer Company with Zari

Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra has developed an institution for woman Zari artisan's producers.

Our Organisation has been playing a vital and catalytic role in promoting and supporting rural women Zari artisans and workers with a goal of making them empowered and self -dependent by supporting the workers and forming their groups and self -managed institutions. The organisation has facilitated to form an institution owned and managed by woman. The institution is a producers company named Bunan Hasta Kala Producer Company Limited.

Our experience, achievement and aspiration

The initiative of developing women's institution is one of our missions to fulfill commitment

of empowering women in the disadvantaged and low income earning communities across state of West Bengal presently. Zari workers are mainly working as labourers getting very low prices, are not able to acquire capacity by their own for self managed production and marketing with standard improved technology. Moreover, the Zari artisans are unorganised. Their social position is some what low in the village societies. The Zari artisans mainly women who need special attention and support About the craft industry - In Zari-Embroidery the cloth is tied on wooden Dhadda, fitted with wooden stand and the first required design is stencilled with the help of stencil paper on the cloth then embroidery is being done according to the design with Zari thread like stones, beads, etc. This is a traditional artisan work to put on the materials for dresses like Lahenga, Dupatta, Salwar, Churida, Zari, etc. The craft of embroidery has both economic and cultural relevance. The embroidery work has provided employment opportunities to many people. At the same time embroidery dress materials have a good demand in domestic and international

Our Experience - We have some experience since long before when we have started working with the poor,

disadvantaged families, women and the artisans-mainly zari artisans. Women Self Help Groups are formed and developed, assisted and linked with institutions. NOSKK-our short name is accepted by communities and recognised by the Government and international donors. Our organisation has been working to advocate on behalf of exploited, disadvantaged and un-empowered women, girls and the communities to secure rights, to make them capacitated and avail benefits linking with Government and civil society organisations.

Women are playing a very vital role in developing the craft in zari embroidery. Traditionally economic

participation as zari artisans and being successful in it is a real change for women, whose exposer and mobility are limited. In many areas like in Howrah district of West Bengal. Women zari workers suffer due to preponderance of middlemen and artisans – women are not getting satisfactory of money out of this job. Most of the women artisans in this sector are deprived in the right of winning and generating income out of this type of work, despite of possessing right skills of doing embroidery work. It is found and learned that there is not a single woman in the villages in our area who may be regarded as full-fledged women zari entrepreneur.

Our Need - Presently we intend to promote, develop and sustain women owned, led and managed self-enterprises, producer's organisation and development process in the communities. Thus, it is required to participate and cooperate our endeavour for fulfilling the mission of self-sustaining women artisans owned and managed enterprises like Bunan Hasta Kala and the SHG Micro Enterprises. The need is to provide technical and financial support for skill up-gradation, product design development, marketing knowledge and network knowledge as well as human resources for managing the enterprise. The new institution which is a producer company requires some support for managing and functioning for the development of the crafts- Zari products. That will be more marketable and attractive to customers of various segments and locations and the company expects to grow its' business with a capacity of development in a sustainable manner and cost-effective way.

Bunan Hastakala Producer Company was participated in different mela with their product.

Sanitary Napkin **Production** (SNP) organized by Freedom SHG Group Women are raising their voices and asserting their rights including their rights to reproductive and preventive health as well as how to live in hygienic way in today's busy life. In the month of June 2009, the twelve young energetic girls member create CBO name as Freedom Group and participated in Micro Small Medium Enterprise (MSME) training programme of Govt. of W.B. After the training, Freedom Group purchase machine and raw materials and started Napkin Production in the NSKK premises. They are also engaged in local marketing for sell the product nursing home, Hospitals and medical shops etc.



Adolescent Friendly Service:

Adolescence is an important stage of growth for children. During adolescence, girls are preparing for their future roles as adult women. Intervening at this stage can help girls overcome barriers to empowerment in adulthood since girls represent the next generation of mothers and social and economic actors. In a conservative society like India adolescence often face hindrance from society to discuss about reproductive and sexual health related issues openly and to obtain required help for their need like proper information, counselling, treatment etc. Adolescence possess different range of reproductive and sexual health challenges which include the consequences of early marriage, unsafe abortions, high-risk behaviour, lack of awareness about contraception and reproductive health issues, reproductive tract infections (RTIs) and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) including HIV / AIDS and non-consensual sex.

Adolescent Friendly Service, supported by Ms Sandra Dahlen and Janne North from Sweden, we are running a Drop-In Centre. 1050 Adolescent Girls attend the Drop-In Centre for many kinds of discussion and get facilities of Sanitary Napkins. Maria Khatun felicitated the Class two days in every week and discussed about Child Marriage, Child Abuse, Adolescence, Hand Washing, Menstrual Hygiene, HIV and stories like Poulomider Kotha and AV Shows. Every month 246 Adolescent girls are attending the Dropin Centre and they got facilities of Sanitary Napkins in low cost.

Scheme for Adolescent Girls (SAG):

Collaboration with the Department of Women & Child Development and social welfare has been implementing Scheme for Adolescent Girls-Kanyasree Prakalpa Convergence Programme implemented by Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra at 3 blocks of Howrah Districts.

Main Objective of this programme:

- To reduce different social vulnerabilities like dropout, early marriage, trafficking,
- Mainstreaming out of school adolescent girls through linking them with Kanyasree Prakalpa.

• Skill building by providing vocational training in convergence with Utkarsha Bangla.

Project Area: Uluberia Municipality, Panchla, Jagatballavpur Block at Howrah Districts.

THALI – "Tuberculosis Health Action Learning Initiative"

This project is led by World Health Partners (WHP), in collaboration with consortium members, Child in Need Institute (CINI), and John Snow India (JSI). THALI aims to strengthen Tuberculosis Control efforts in West Bengal by using a technology-based reporting platform and an inclusive service delivery model for appropriate TB diagnosis and treatment.

Activities:

- Counselling of TB patients, their Care givers and their family.
- House Visit around those area where patients are identified and beyond for spreading TB
- Advocacy with the stakeholders for example counsellors, school teachers and government officials.
- Meeting with School Student, Club Member and SHG groups.
- Linking the patients and their family members with Social security scheme.
- Participated in a Health Screening Camps in the Zari and Jewellery Hubs of Panchla and Domjur, Sankrail of Haora district with District Health and family Welfare Samity (RNTCP), District Tuberculosis Center, Howrah

Others Training Programme:

ASHA training Center:

Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra was got accreditation from National institute of Open schooling under an autonomous institution under department of School education and literacy M.H.R.D. Govt. of India. With Collaboration with Child in Need Institute (CINI) Noskk is organising ASHA Training. This Year Total 24 Training was held with 889 Participants.

Activities on SDGs:

Marginalised Community led Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) advancing UNSDGs (United Nations Sustainable Development goals) and Human Right for

inclusive Development: Collaboration with Forum Syd and Organisation Functioning for Eytham's Respect (OFFER) Noskk is implementing the Programme in 5 Villages of Uluberia Municipality, Sankrail and Panchla Block with 1000 population.

- We did 32 Voter ID Cards form fill up in 2019-2020.
- Public distribution System- 63 Ration forms are filled and submitted in Municipality Food Office.
- Pan Card Registration 110 Pan form registration was done.

Kolkata Sanved

Empowerment Workshop: Organized in collaboration with Kolkata_Sanved an Empowerment Workshop for 30 adolescent girls in our area. In total we have organized three empowerment workshops for 80 young women of our area.

The Empowerment Workshop enables the adolescent girls to create a life exactly the way they want it. There are two reasons we don't have what we want in life. We don't know what we want and we don't have the tools to manifest it.

The workshop helps them develop a comprehensive vision for their life and provide tools to manifest it. It goes beyond therapeutic approach to growth that focuses on healing wounds from past. In fact it helps envision what one most desires and create it, therefore motivating one to grow by the power of one's dream rather than their wounds.

The workshop is four-days long, intense and focuses on the 7 core areas of an individual's life, which are Body, Work, Spirituality, Sexuality, Relationships, Money and Emotions. It helps individuals to create their own path towards their vision/dream/goal and thus empowers them to be a part of the society.

Diploma in Dance Movement Therapy: Kolkata Sanved's Dance Movement Therapy Leadership Academy, a year-long program held in collaboration with Nari-O Sishu-Kalyan Kendra.
