In 1979, we, NOSKK started our journey. In the year 2021-22 we turned 43 years old. This year has witnessed more growth of our organisation Nari-o-Sishu Kalyan Kendra (NOSKK). This is also another active year of hopeful progress towards our mission with the aim of moving forward in the development of vulnerable women and children.

This year we have a number of achievements for our organisation. We continued to encourage women towards Non Traditional Livelihood i.e. Cab Driving, E Rickshaw driving, Mobile Repairing technician. In addition to that, NOSKK has been instructed by the government to carry out a new livelihood vocational training "Paschim Banga Society for Skill Development - PBSSD" for the youth this year. NOSKK also facilitates Self Help Groups to support Women Empowerment through projects like Empowerment Workshops such as Dance Movement Therapy and a Self Defense Class (Karate) to achieve the Sustainable Development Goal of Gender Equality. Furthermore, we strengthened our fight against tobacco through multiple awareness and signature campaigns, rallies and letters to the government. It is important to us to support our children and youth's education. This is reflected in our work through Taleem-Ki-Taqat and Bhabiswat Sponsorship Programme. Another important programme of ours is the Operation Red Alert: Safe Village Programme, which focuses on identifying human trafficking and dangerous behaviours through educational visits in schools. We are in collaboration with Freunde der Erziehungskunst Rudolf Steiners, where we have worked together with two volunteers from Germany each year since 2018. These are only some of our many diverse programmes that we have been working on to strengthen our community and realise our vision and mission.

Finally, I would like to thank all members of NOSKK for their hard work and dedication to our organisation. After the effective progress of this year, I would like to continue to focus on educational programmes and our special sponsorship as well as research study for the upcoming years. I am thankful to everyone who encourages and ensures the successful work of NOSKK. I hope we will continue our work with such enthusiasm and participation in the future.

HISTORY



HISTORY:

After a devastating flood in West Bengal in 1978, initiatives were taken by a group of young educated women to organise the poor and marginalised women of the district to protect their interest toward a sustainable livelihood.

In the year 1979, this women's group named Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra (engl.: Women and Children Welfare Center) was registered under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act, in order to immediately respond to the flood victims and help overcome the economic poverty through livelihood options.

During the last two decades, the evolution of Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra (NOSKK), has successfully spread out its activities in a number of blocks of Howrah with thousands of women and adolescents.

Now we work in close collaboration with Tajmahal Gram Bikash Kendra – a leading organisation of this district, national and international resource sharing agencies, the state, and national level government as well as non-government institutions.

MISSION, VISION AND GOALS

Mission:

NOSKK aims to empower the oppressed and marginalised people to make them self-reliant and confident. The main focus is laid on the socially, economically, politically and culturally vulnerable groups such as women and children. Therefore, we work closely together with them to achieve the above mentioned envisioned sustainable society

Vision:

The aspiration of Nari-O-Sishu Kalyan Kendra is to be a self-reliant society, based on human values like cooperation, participation, justice, respect, and love. Furthermore it's a society where people will participate in a decentralised political process, where the economy is based on localised production and consumption. On top of that, the environment will be free from pollution and exploitation; the people will sustain their own indigenous socio-cultural identity. The envisioned community is free from the forces of the patriarchy and therefore, more peaceful and harmonious.

CURRENT PROGRAMMES

Educational Programmes:

NOSKK believes in empowerment through education and especially, that education should be accessible for everyone. As a result, there are multiple running projects that target mainly young children and adults, that need support to get the education they deserve.

One of these projects is the **Bhabiswat Scholarship programme**, which was created in 2018 by two German volunteers. It provides the students not only with financial aid, but also educational workshops, english classes and creative outlets. They are taught in three different grouped that are sorted by age since there is a large age range from 15-23 years old.

Many of the classes they take are taught by the German volunteers.

The students backgrounds vary, however they all share the inability to pay for all the costs that come with school and/ or university. Many of them lost a working parent or don't have one due to illness. Others have a family that doesn't have a high enough income to pay for everything.

Ever since it was created, the programme has experienced fast growth, going from supporting five students to over thirty young and motivated learners.

NOSKK also supports the education of younger children, ages 5-16. The space for that is given by **Taleem-Ki-Taqat**, a project that provides students with additional classes, due to government schools not offering all the classes that are needed for a well rounded education. From English, to handwriting, spelling, dance and more, the classes aim to keep the students motivated, educated and guide them towards a healthy child development.

The students are taught in groups of about 30 children, sorted by age, to make closer supervision possible.



CURRENT PROGRAMMES

Students can learn more about dealing with Computers in the **Computer Training Center**. There they can take a two month course that ends in the awarding of an official certificate, proving there freshly acquired fundamental skills in working with Computers, DTP, FA and the Internet in general.

To improve the knowledge of languages, there is weekly **tutoring** available, taught by the German volunteers. There are classes for both, German and spoken English. The English classes are taught according to level While some young adults are being taught more advanced and academic english, others focus on the basics and expressing their emotions. Additionally to the students, the working women of NOSKK attend an English basics class, either online or in person.



Empowerment Programmes:

One of our main initiatives is to improving the financial well-being of women by providing access to credit, encouraging income generation and skill development, facilitating access to government programs, offering social support, promoting empowerment and leadership, fostering asset creation, and reducing vulnerability. For this reason, NOSKK administered a **Women Empowerment Programme Through Self Help Groups**. Here, many women can come together and share issues regarding their livelihood, discuss solutions and provide emotional support. This programme has reached a total of 4886 thousand members in the Uluberia Sub Division of the Howrah district and continues to grow.



CURRENT PROGRAMMES

Nutrition Programme:

Since 2018, we have encouraged our community to create their own home state kitchen garden. Over the course of the last nine seasons, we have successfully distributed 20896 packets of different vegetables in 300 groups. Through this programme, community members are able to cultivate their own vegetables and produce better yields than ever before.

For the second year in a row, we offered **Dance Movement Therapy (DMT)** in collaboration with Kolkata Sanved. Kolkata Sanved is a woman-led pioneer targeting trauma, healing and empowerment of marginalized populations through dance. The workshop is led by the Kolkata Sanved Maya Sen, Tilotoma and Shobha Di. The programme aims to support youth and their goals by building their confidence and self-esteem, empowering them, teaching them to express themselves, and understand their emotions through dance.

Skill and Livelihood Programmes:

The first step in escaping discrimination and reaching emancipation for any vulnerable social group is the ability to provide for oneself financially. Due to this NOSKK offers working education and job opportunities to these people.

NOSKK has implemented the programme named **Changing Gender Norms by Promoting Non-Traditional Skills and Livelihoods for Girls and Young Women** with support from the Girls Count Carmdaksh and Ford Foundation, in Howrah district in October 2018.

The main goal of the project is to influence a larger narrative and norms around gender roles and occupations, and change the public discourse around it. NOSKK hopes to do so by promoting non-traditional skills training for girls and young women in the district and employ them in areas of work that are considered to be non-traditional. This area includes jobs like Toto-driver, mobile repairer and electrician.

Advance level Skill Development Course on Machine Embroidery with CAD organized by Director of Directorate of Vocational Education & Training focuses on twice a year workshop to learn about trade machine embroidery.



The **Paschim banga society for skill development** is, with its 360 participants, a large project that offers a lot of different courses focusing on working skills. Courses include learning to be a Self-Employed Tailor, Assistant Beauty Therapist, Associate - Desktop Publisher (DTP), Domestic Data Entry Operator or Accounts Executive (Accounts Payable & Receivables).



Adolescent Health Programmes:

Any person whether it be a child, woman or man deserves to have basic human rights. Often, vulnerable groups are denied these rights and therefore don't have access to sanitary items, and education towards a healthy development. In order to reduce these inequalities, NOSKK offers multiple programmes that support minorities in the given areas.

Adolescent Friendly Service

With the help of two Swedish donors, Sandra Dahlen and Janne North, NOSKK created the Adolescent Friendly Service and Sanitary Napkin Production. This is a drop-in centre for adolescent girls to create awareness about female related topics such as reproductive health. Additionally, sanitary napkins of low cost are provided to the young women in three blocks namely Uluberia Municipality, Panchla and Sankrail of Howrah district.

Another human rights project is the **Freedom Sanitary Napkin Production Unit** which was founded in 2009 by a CBO named 'Freedom Group'. This group participated in the Micro Small Medium Enterprise (MSME) training programme of Govt. of W.B., and subsequently started a napkin production in the NOSKK premises. Their product is sold locally in nursing homes, hospitals and medical shops, ACTED, CINI etc

Scheme for Adolescent Girls (SAG-KP) programme

Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra is one of the implementing partners of **Scheme for Adolescent Girls (SAG-KP) programme**. In collaboration with the Department of Women & Child Development and Social Welfare (WCD & SW), NOSKK has been implementing SAG-KP Convergence Programmes in Panchla, Uluberia Municipality and Jagatballabpur Block of the Howrah district. The main objectives of the programme are to address adolescent girl's (age 11-18) multi dimensional vulnerabilities in education, nutrition protection and health. This includes reducing different social vulnerabilities such as school drop outs, early marriage, and trafficking. Furthermore, it incorporates mainstreaming out of school adolescent girls through linking them with Kanyashree Prakalpa and encouraging skill building through the provision of vocational training in convergence with Utkarsha Bangla.

Protection Programmes:

Our goal is to protect the most vulnerable groups of our society, whether that is children and adolescents or migrants or victims of domestic violence. In order to empower these groups and raise awareness about dangers they may face, we started two counselling projects, awareness workshops and offer migrant labour families a support system.

The **Peace maker programme** is a counselling project, that focuses on keeping the peace in homes. It aims to prevent domestic violence from happening and to stop it, where it has already found its way into the home of a family. The project works closely together with the victims. It creates a trustful atmosphere that allows the people to work through their experiences and guides them towards a healthier life. The counselling taking place in the project is essential for victims, to understand their situation and to realise that they are not to blame.

CURRENT PROGRAMMES

ORA – Operation Red Alert: Safe Village Programme is a project founded in May 2018 that provides awareness workshops for identifying human trafficking, preventing dangerous behaviour, child marriage, child abuse, and domestic violence. Two staff members visit two schools (grade 8-12) each month to show youth-friendly campaign videos, comic books and spark discussion targeting these topics amongst the adolescents. Furthermore, we inform the students about options like the Red Alert Helpline or the possibility to contact the local IP or police. In the village, staff additionally educates parents about child marriage and abuse, human trafficking and domestic violence so they will understand the dangers and begin to protect their children. Since 2018 we have successfully visited 15 villages and reached 90 schools with a total 10120 students and community members.



A further human rights programme we have is the **Migrant Resilience Collaborative Programme** launched in July 2021. This is a partnership project between Jansahas and NOSKK and is implemented in four blocks of Birbhum district, namely, Bolpur, Nanoor, Rampurhat-II and Labpur and three Blocks in Murshidabad district, namely, Farakka, Samserganj, Suti-II and Dhuliyani Municipality. The goal of this programme to ensure the safety, resilience, security and mobility of migrant worker communities. This is put into effect by giving migrant workers and their families a support system to rely on in case of unwanted situations, facilitating the delivery of social security entitlements and better financial initiatives. Furthermore, we encourage the enablement of worker protection, responsible recruitment by industries and the prevention of trafficking of young people through child right's protection.



NOSKK knows that escaping abusive situations is extremely difficult and takes a lot of willpower and professional support. This support is given by the **Legal aid clinic** for vulnerable groups. Through this programme NOSKK provides families with lawyers that help them with things such as separation, divorce and custody battles. It gives the victims the legal support and advice they need and deserve, to take the final step out of their abusive households.

CURRENT PROGRAMMES

In the face of the COVID-19 pandemic second phase, Nari O Sishu Kalyan Kendra (NOSKK) in Howrah, West Bengal, emerged as a beacon of resilience despite limited resources. Their multifaceted interventions targeted vulnerable groups, encompassing awareness campaigns, mental health support, medical aid, livelihood training, financial assistance, and care packages.

The organization conducted 43 awareness camps in 37 villages, engaging 1744 participants in crucial discussions on health precautions and COVID-19 safety. With a focus on mental health, NOSKK provided tele-counselling support, addressing the psychosocial needs of women and girls facing domestic violence.

Medical support extended to individuals affected by COVID-19 included health check-ups with essential equipment. NOSKK's commitment to empowering women was evident in plans to train 100 more in various livelihood skills and increase production in the sanitary napkin unit.

Financial assistance was directed towards 30 students, enabling them to pursue higher education, while 122 students received supplementary education support. The organization further distributed dry rations to over 155 families, prioritizing vulnerable groups such as daily wage laborers and women-headed households. Safety kits, comprising masks, sanitary napkins, soap, and detergent, were provided to communities.



NOSKK's investment in capacity building was reflected in workshops for volunteers, field workers, and community members, covering subjects like SDGs, women empowerment, and organizational policies. The organization actively worked to build a network of NGOs for collaborative efforts and initiated social security measures, including collaborating with the food department for ration card distribution.

In essence, NOSKK's response to the COVID-19 crisis in Howrah is a testament to their holistic and community-driven approach, addressing immediate needs while laying the foundation for lasting empowerment.



CURRENT PROGRAMMES

German Volunteers:

In the year 2016 NOSKK established a correspondence with the German organisation “Freunde der Erziehungskunst Rudolf Steiners”, in English “Friends of Waldorf Education Rudolf Steiners”. This organisation gives young students the opportunity to work in social areas for one year in different countries of the world for stepping in cultural exchange, learning from each other and understanding different types of living. Since 2016, each year, young women from Germany have visited and worked with NOSKK for a year to support them with educational classes, office work, additional projects, counselling and more.

COLLABORATIONS AND WORKSHOPS

Over the years, NOSKK has started to collaborate with multiple other programmes in order to offer, for example workshops, out of their own area of expertise. Thanks to this, both, students and teachers continue to learn and expand their knowledge.

The workshops and rallies raise awareness about topics such as equality, sexual abuse and more, and unite the participants through their learning experiences.

To raise awareness, and reduce, the abuse of tobacco, the **Tobacco Campaign** was started. It's goal is to keep young children and adults, especially girls, safe from tobacco and it's addictive nature. Thanks to the campaign, NOSKK managed to send more than 400 handwritten letters directly to the Prime Minister. Both the staff and the old enough students wrote these letters in which they asked not to change the legal age for tobacco use, but to keep it at 18 years old. Furthermore, they addressed the problem of designated smoking areas and in general public smoking. The participants received the necessary knowledge for the letters with the help of a meeting with a woman in New Delhi, who presented the dangers of tobacco. There was a special focus on the people with difficulties of writing, to help make their words readable.



COLLABORATIONS AND WORKSHOPS

Mrs. Sadia Afrin held a **workshop** to raise awareness about the **right to education and early marriage**. Through monthly meetings including the reading of a story, role play, discussions and sharing personal experiences, our Bhabiswat girl students learned about their rights and the importance of becoming independent through awareness and education.



NOSKK collaborates with the West Bengal Karwaan Center to offer **Karate classes** to our youth groups. The weekly classes are aimed to promote physical fitness, self defense, confidence and empowerment within the participants. The students are able to learn freestyle exercise, punches, kicks, blocks, shadow fights and kata, and can present their skills in belt exams and competitions.
